FROM THE DIRECTOR

Goodbye 2023, Hello 2024!

This last quarter of 2023 saw both successes and challenges. In October, we continued our partnership with Communicare's Jail Substance Abuse Program and added individual, onsite therapy services at the jail. Our therapist, Kimberly Cook-Lee is the provider and is so excited to provide trauma services to the women in the program. It was also time for our day-long vision planning retreat. During this time, staff identified agency strengths and cast our vision for the next few years. Overarching themes included refining programs, gathering impact data, and improving client experiences. And, on Oct 30th we hosted an open house where partners and local officials were invited to tour our facility and meet our staff.

November brought some staff changes and resignations. Although change is often difficult, it is also inevitable and necessary. So, during this time, we welcomed a new staff member and some new leadership. We also implemented a new performance management process to assist individual team members in establishing goals that are consistent with our vision plan.

In December, end-of-year preparations are made and Emily Neel begins to draw up the annual Impact Report (be on the lookout for it in the coming month)! We were thrilled to make a large payment toward our building loan to the tune of \$150,000! We will enter 2024 with a building debt of about \$177,000 remaining – which is impressive given that the building has only been standing for a year. Finally, we welcome new members and leadership to our board of directors. Kyle Williamson will be president, Meredith Dubree as vice-president, and Reta McMillen as Secretary.

practice to develop new coping skills, therefore I enjoy the use of creative art and expression to help clients discover what works best according to individual personality and strengths. I have also received specialized training in Accelerated Resolution Therapy which is an incredible body-based intervention for trauma. In the future, I hope to learn more about the field of equine-assisted psychotherapy which is very effective for the treatment of trauma. Overall, I consider each client a "hero" because of their great courage and strive to share a message of hope...healing is possible!

On a personal note, I have been married to my husband (and best friend) for 22 years. I enjoy animals, music, outdoors, photography, reading, and travel. My favorite place to visit is always the beach while the best travel destination has been St. John, USVI. I am an adventurer, dreamer, and optimist who never gives up and strongly identifies with my faith. 




